


# Proper Nouns

## **The Format**

We've created a color *Proper Nouns* poster for your classroom, a color copy of the lesson for your Smart Board, and black line masters of the lesson and activities for your students. Our goal is a lesson that you can use immediately.

## **Center or Whole Group**

*Proper Nouns* can be used in a Center or Whole Group setting. No matter what you decide, we suggest that you read the *Proper Nouns* lesson aloud with your class and have students cut and paste their *Proper Nouns* card into a Language Notebook. A Composition Book works well for this purpose. The activities following the *Proper Nouns* lesson can then be completed as Center work or as part of your Whole Group instruction.

## **The Lesson Plan**

After reading about *Proper Nouns*, students will:

- trace the words on the *Proper Nouns* card, color the gingerbread man on the card, and glue the *Proper Nouns* card into their Language Notebooks.
- answer *Proper Nouns* comprehension questions.
- rewrite sentences correctly capitalizing proper nouns.
- identify and color proper nouns in a puzzle to reveal a mystery picture.

**Note:** Answers for the activities are at the end of the lesson.




# MYSTERY PUZZLE
